


Reading and phonics: How we encourage and support reading at school

Here are a few ways in which we support children to read at Elvington:

ERIC (Everyone Reads In Class): This is designated reading for pleasure time.

Bookshelf books: These are books that have been carefully chosen to match the children's current topic. Children are free to read these books throughout their half termly topic.

Reading bingo: Children in KS2 have a grid of different genres that they are encouraged to read (found in their planners). This is to encourage a broad range of reading.

Library slots: Children are encouraged to use their lunchtime library slot.


Guided reading: High quality guided reading texts that have been carefully selected.

VIPERS: We use VIPERS to teach the reading skills consistently throughout school (vocabulary, inference, prediction, explanation, retrieval, summarising or sequencing).




Featured Author: Anneliese Emmans Dean


